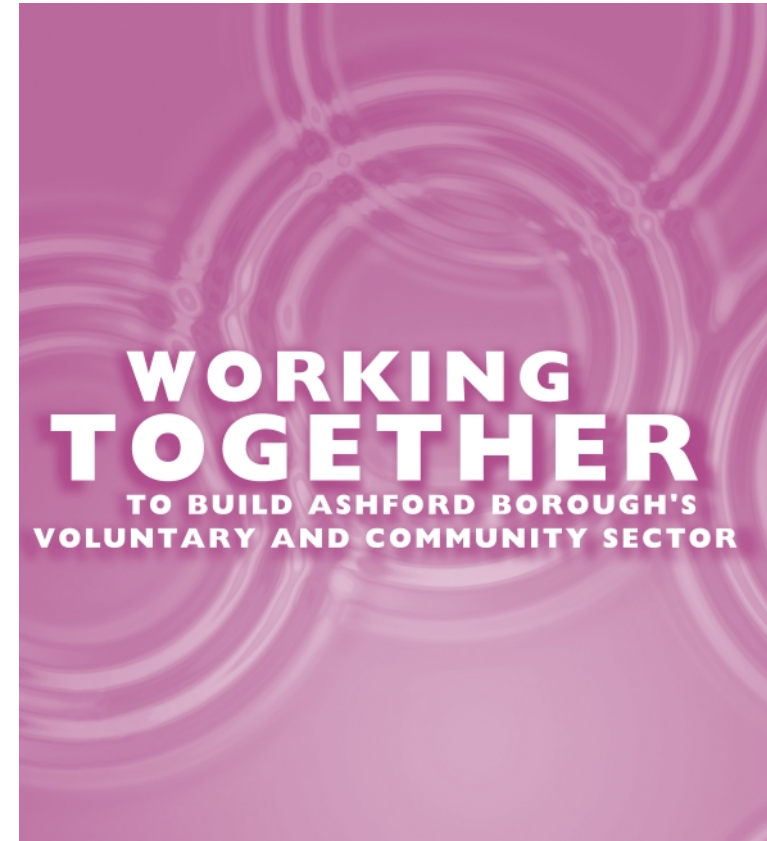

WHAT IS THE VOLUNTARY & COMMUNITY SECTOR?

The voluntary & community sector (VCS) is described as the glue that holds society together. In Ashford borough over 850 organisations deliver a broad range of local services to young and old, able and disadvantaged alike. Voluntary and community groups also provide many of our cultural, sport and leisure opportunities. Most organisations are charities, some employ specialists, but many are informal volunteer-based groups. All are reliant, in whole or part, on the time and goodwill of local people.

The VCS plays a crucial role in our quality of life and in strengthening the fabric of our communities. What would you do without the Citizen's Advice Bureau, the church youth club, the community hall, the elderly drop-in, marriage guidance, the amateur drama group, your local sports club?

The VCS in Ashford is well-established and makes a major social and economic contribution to the borough.

- Its services, volunteer time and assets total £150 million* p.a

FOR THE FUTURE:

Ashford is a key partner in Government's Communities Plan for growth in the South East. We are challenged with building 31,000 homes and creating 28,000 jobs over the next 30 years. ASHFORD COMMUNITY NETWORK

Ashford Community Network was originally formed in September 2004 from a core group of VCS representatives. We are now established as a limited company and have applied for charitable status. We are led by an independent board comprising representatives from

WHAT WE DO:

ACN is a 'family of networks' bringing together key voluntary organisations and community leaders from across the borough. We meet regularly on a variety of subjects. One of ACN's key roles is to act as a single point of contact for public and private partners, and the media.

OUR AIMS ARE TO

- act as a strategic decision making and consultative body
- co-ordinate and represent local VCS interests and views
- build the sector's capacity and infrastructure
- develop a more enterprising and sustainable sector
- enable front line services to meet growing community needs

ACN also works hard to raise the profile of the VCS so that partners and the public understand how important voluntary and community organisations are. We also organise events to support the sector and its development.

THE BIG ISSUES

ACN is working in partnership with Ashford Borough Council, Ashford's Future, the Ashford Partnership and Department for Communities & Local Government to

- Ensure there are a wide range of community facilities and services in Ashford's new neighbourhoods
- Enable the VCS to deliver more quality public services
- Build the sector's capacity to manage more community/cultural assets & facilities
- Deliver a VCS Resource Centre with affordable offices and hot desking
- Relocate voluntary organisations affected by town centre development
- Sustain and build the sector through new collaborations and partnerships
- Create a positive sense of place, community and belonging across the borough.

Research shows that our VCS needs to grow by an additional:

- 400 organisations
- 3,000 volunteers
- £50 million p.a.

to meet the needs of Ashford's population by 2026.
